# SSA Mentoring Programme

New programme of support has been established with funding secured from Creative Scotland for a 12-month pilot programme, led by Council Members Jenny Pope and Gillian McFarland. This is in direct response to recent times. Programme will take a conversational approach to enable mentees to define goals and plan towards future projects and gain support, insight and encouragement along the way.

The project will pair together established and emerging artists mentors. Mentors will be paid for their time and training will be provided throughout.

There will be an application process for both positions, and this will be launched in the coming weeks. Thanks were made to those of whom had already noted interest, and the administration of all to date.

### Engramme | 7 May - 12 June 2022

Selected artist: Maja Quille A series of cyanotypes based on single-use plastic waste, time and sunlight and were produced during lockdown.

Working closely with Engramme Director Anne-Sophie Ohmer to confirm exhibition plans though it is anticipated that travel will not be possible this year due to continued lockdown issues in Canada.

#### 124th Annual Exhibition

ESSA 12-week exhibition slot: confirmed as 10th December - 5th March. Date allocation still being discussed, though SSA will be going first in this rotation. 2022 marks 130 years since the first SSA Annual Exhibition and to celebrate SSA plan to exhibit a series of works by past SSA members or invited elements in the SSA Annual Exhibition. This will include loaned works from a variety of private and public galleries, for example: Auguste Rodin, Bet Low, Paul Klee and Edvard Munch.

#### 8. Open Discussion

Ruth Nicol congratulated the committee in remaining agile during another difficult year and their commitment to take opportunities out to other areas of the country. Also pleased to see an open and inclusive selection throughout. Statistics reported were impressive, however noted that the Annual Exhibition catalogue sales were reduced and questioned if this should be reviewed.

Leena Nammari added that the catalogue format was problematic. Scale too large to be transportable as a take-away. She noted that the Annual Exhibition felt exclusionary in only

representing 99 members post-pandemic, and found this extremely disappointing.

Judith Shaylor noted her support for the exhibition and the work from the team included to make it happen. She requested an update on the potential opportunity with partners in Gibraltar.

Louise Ritchie added her disappointment and the missed opportunity to include all members post-pandemic in the Annual Exhibition and questioned the long-term plan.

Jamie McAteer noted that a digital catalogue format was considered and will be reviewed again this year if better solution can be found. Artists generally preferred hard-copies, and so a discussion to be continued alongside budget.

Jamie McAteer explained the stages of the selection process and the series of limitations that contributed to the hang that was presented: the impact of the pandemic had meant many artists were unable to access printing studios etc. thus led to a noticeable gap of mediums in the submissions received; many older works were submitted which as per the SSA Constitution these were unable to be considered; the tight restrictions within RSA to meet the necessary Covid-guidelines impacted parking for hand in and out as well as the installation processes. All these elements were carefully considered as part of this wider selection process.

Zealous was chosen as a platform to continue to keep costs reduced for all members. Platform has support available and with ongoing improvements. If there is a demand for a change to this platform please inform admin and this will be reviewed.

Jamie McAteer reported that the Gibraltar opportunity had been paused due to changing of spaces and travel restrictions and is due to be reviewed for 2023/24.

### 9. AOCB

Co-Presidents thanked all who attended this year's AGM.

Meeting closed 12.30pm
